

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All the Birds in the Sky

Are science and nature adversaries? Do the aims of the two come into conflict? Certain people want to think so to influence public policy. Could this be a false premise? These are the questions Charlie Jane Anders is asking in *All the Birds in the Sky*.

The heart of the novel is the friendship of Patricia Delfine and Laurence Armstead. Patricia is an empathetic girl who discovers she is magically sensitive. Laurence Armstead loves science and tinkering with machines. Both discovered their abilities at a very young age and come from unsupportive families who would prefer they expressed more mainstream interests. Patricia and Laurence meet as teenagers and help each other get through school. A rift develops in their friendship when Patricia demonstrates magic to Laurence. At the same time, a mysterious school counselor, promises Patricia magical training if she kills Laurence. She refuses and Laurence's parents send him to a harsh military school. A more reputable person offers Patricia magical training. She accepts as long she can rescue Laurence from the school. With the help of an AI Laurence has created, Patricia rescues him. They both get to go to schools that match their interests.

Ten years later, Laurence and Patricia meet in San Francisco. Laurence is working with a group of scientists. Patricia is waitressing and helping people with her magic. They renew their friendship. Laurence's team and Patricia's magically community are concerned of possible catastrophic disaster. They fear combination of social and environmental crisis could wreck the world. Both groups are working on a plans to deal with the


problem. Unfortunately, these plans come into conflict. Can Patricia and Laurence figure out a way were both sides could work together?

Patricia cares a lot about people. She always wants to help others. She refuses to abandon Laurence when he is in trouble. She keeps an open mind about the possibilities technology has to offer. Patricia is impressed by what Laurence can build and understands his point of view.

Laurence also has an open mind. He does not dismiss Patricia claims about magic. Laurence does get scared when he sees proof of her power and regrets avoiding Patricia afterward. When one of Laurence's experiments endangers a colleague, he goes to Patricia for help. He is prepared to accept the consequences of dealing with the magical world.

The world is a few years in the future. The most notable change is the use of Caddys, a hand held computer interface. It changes the way people interact with each other in stronger way that smart phones do today. There is a major environmental incident. It causes a social upheaval but does not lay civilization to waste. Laurence, Patricia, and their respective friends react to it as best they can.

The central idea about this book is friendship and communication. When Patricia and Laurence are cut from each other things do not go well. They care about each other and listen to the other's point of view. It is because of their friendship that a possible long term solution can be found. They realize that science and nature are not opposed to each other but part of a larger whole. In understanding both, the problems that face the world today can be solved.



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The Killing Joke

In the 1980s, everyone read three Batman books: *The Dark Knight Returns*, *Batman: Year One*, and *The Killing Joke*. The first was Batman at the end of his career. The second was Batman at the beginning of his career. The last was the ultimate fight between Batman and the Joker. The books attracted the interest outside the comic community. DC has made animated features for the first two books and now they complete series with an adaptation of *The Killing Joke*.

The story opens with Batman and Batgirl trying to stop Paris Franz from taking over his uncle's criminal empire. Franz takes a liking to Batgirl and taunts her. She eventually confronts him and almost kills Franz. Barbara Gordon decides to give up being Batgirl. Batman decides to visit the Joker at the Arkham Asylum. Batman fears that the he or the Joker will die if they cannot end their conflict. He discovers that the Joker has escaped from Arkham. The Joker cripples Barbara and kidnaps Commissioner Gordon. The Joker tortures Gordon at an amusement park. While executing his plan the Joker looks back to his past life before the accident that scarred him forever. Can Batman rescue Gordon in time? Is death the only solution the Batman/Joker conflict?

The original comic story was too short for a feature adaptation. The producers of the film decided to extend the story with the material about Barbara Gordon and Franz. The story was already problematic with Barbara's maiming. This is part of the long history of killing or hurting women characters in order to motivate the hero. The added material makes it worse since Barbara gives up being Batgirl. Batman has been in the same situation before but instead of learning from it and moving on Barbara quits. Joe Straczynski wrote a story about Barbara just


before *The Killing Joke*. There she was still an effective and well -adjusted hero having a night on the town with Wonder Woman and Zatanna. The screenwriter should have looked to that story for inspiration or have Gail Simone, who has written stories about Barbara Gordon for years, write that part of the film.

Mark Hamill does an outstanding performance as the Joker. He returns to the role that he took in *Batman: The Animated Series*. Hamill can perform the immense range needed for this story. He conveys the level of the Joker's viciousness in the story. At the same time, we feel sympathy for the man the Joker was before the accident that drove him mad. Hamill expresses the character's anxiety of being a failure as husband and father and desire to make people laugh. He also does a flawless delivery of the Joker's final line, a joke that makes the Batman laugh.

The story based on the original book is well adapted. The art style is not the same as the book but it serves the film. The filmmakers also had the same level of intensity in the original in terms of violence. A few years ago, writer Grant Morrison offered a mind-blowing theory about the ending of the story. The screenwriter and director kept the ending's ambiguity intact and Morrison's interpretation still valid.

The Killing Joke is a film worth seeing. The film has problematic elements about Barbara Gordon, but at least the film's creative team put some thought in the story and did not focus on spectacle. It is much better than recent DC live action films.

The film shows Barbara starting her role as Oracle, hacker extraordinaire in the DC Universe. Let us hope that DC Animation will do a Birds of Prey film and show us Barbara lead a team women superheroes.



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Star Trek Beyond

CBS/Paramount has always been good to Trek fans for the big anniversaries. *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home* came out for the 20th anniversary. The 25th anniversary gave us *Star Trek VI: The Undiscovered Country. Star Trek: Deepspace Nine* had a crossover with the classic original series in the episode "Trials and Tribble-ations" for the 30th anniversary. CBS/Paramount remastered the original series with new special effects for the 40th anniversary. The 50th anniversary gives the fans *Star Trek Beyond* the third film set in the alternate timeline.

The *Enterprise* is in the third year of its five-year mission. Kirk is soon going to be older than his father was at the time of his death and is questioning his place in the world. While at *Yorktown* station, Spock gets bad news from New Vulcan. A distress call comes to *Yorktown* and Starfleet sends the *Enterprise* to investigate. When the *Enterprise* arrives at the planet Altamid, forces under the command of an alien named Krall attack the ship. The crew of the *Enterprise* find themselves stranded on Altamid. Can Kirk and the crew with the help of a local outcast Jaylah, escape and find out what Krall's ultimate plan?

They make good use of the characters in this film. All of them contribute to solving the problem. Scotty uses his engineering knowledge to get them off the planet. Uhura tries to learn more about Krall. Chekov helps Kirk find the rest of the rest of the crew. Sulu piloting skills are essential to get them off Altamid. Spock and McCoy hack the enemy systems.

Jaylah is a great character. She has been surviving on

her own for years and is rebuilding a wrecked starship. She helps Kirk distract Krall's forces while Scotty and Chekov rescue the rest of the crew. If it were not for her, the *Enterprise* crew would not have escaped Altamid and stop Krall.

There were excellent action sequences. The motorcycle run in the enemy camp was great since they used Jaylah's tech to increase the confusion with Krall's forces. Director Justin Lin is able to make the ride in three dimensions and convince the viewer it would work. There was also the final fight between Krall and Kirk, which was in a micro gravity environment and had a similar 3D effect. These were ambitious scenes.

The design of the *Yorktown* was innovative. The designers not only went big, but also were creative in the use of space. The layout of *Yorktown* uses all three dimensions and seems like an Escher painting that works logically. It looks and feels like a large city out in space.


There are many tributes to the entire Trek universe in the film. One of the biggest ones is to *Star Trek: Enterprise*. A good part of the story deals with that era of the universe's history. This was a surprise given that *Enterprise* was not a popular show.

Of the alternate timeline films, this feels most like *Star Trek*. The previous films felt awkward since they were dealing with origins or trying to modernize a previous story. *Star Trek Beyond* is about "exploring strange new worlds." It is also questioning the ideas of political alliances. This is a wonderful 50th anniversary gift.


