### Anime Festival Orlando 2019

Anime Festival Orlando (AFO) 2019, the convention's 20<sup>th</sup>, took place on August 9-11, 2019, at the Wyndham Orlando Resort International Drive. The Guests of Honor were Steve Blum (voice actor), Mary Elizabeth McGlynn (voice actor), Johnny Yong Bosch (voice actor), Tony Oliver (voice actor), Dorah Fine (voice actor), Reuben Langdon (actor), Katrina Browne (voice actor), Billy Kametz (voice actor), Jalen Cassell (voice actor), Cary-Hiroyuki Tagawa (actor), Jason David Frank (actor, *Power Rangers*), Brian Hanford (actor), Laura Stahl (voice actor) and Dan Southworth (actor, *Power Rangers*). Musical acts SANA, Ben BriggsWreck the System, RoboRob, TheWalleh and Mega Ran performed at the convention.

This year I did three presentations. The first I did was **A Brief History of Science Fiction Anime**. Science Fiction and Fantasy anime were the shows to first come to the United States. The first part of presentation covers the early shows that established anime in the US. The second parts are notable Science Fiction anime. I had done this presentation before. This year I added *Outlaw Star* to my list of important SF anime. The show was a great action adventure in a very detailed designed world. One of the reasons *Outlaw Star* is not as highly regarded is that it came out shortly before *Cowboy Bebop*. *Cowboy Bebop* really caught on I with Americans and Japanese Science Fiction fans. Sadly, I did not find any new Science Fiction Anime since 2014. Fantasy and other genres are doing quite well now.

My next presentation was Leiji Matsumoto: King of the Space Opera. Matsumoto created the iconic sagas of Space Battleship Yamato, Space Pirate Captain Harlock, and Galaxy Express 999. Producers created the latter 2 series to satisfy the appetite for space opera that Star Wars created. I found one interesting television movie Saint Elmo: Apostle of Light. Matsumoto produced this for a power company and dealt with a malfunctioning solar power plant on Mercury. I could not find any trailers or clips. This is intriguing since writers do not use Mercury as a setting very often and Matsumoto did try to get the facts about planets and astronomy right in his work. Much of Matsumoto's space opera magna is available in English.

I looked into <u>Superheroes in Anime</u> for my last presentation. I noticed in the last couple of years there was more anime focusing on superheroes using traditional American tropes. In my research this started around the time of the release of *Iron Man*. I picked some older shows which felt like superheroes shows. This included 8<sup>th</sup> Man, Cyborg 009, Devilman, Science Ninja Team Gatchaman, and Sailor Moon. Some of those were more like traditional sentai shows, but those had similar elements to American superheroes like secret identities. I then looked at the newer shows like Heroman (co created by Stan Lee), Tiger and Bunny, Samurai Flamenco, One Punch Man, and the very popular My Hero Academia.

Gerald Rathkolb of the *Anime World Order* podcast explored the <u>Anime in Non Anime</u>. Rathkolb described anime references in the news and on other places. Below are some major examples.

A group on Facebook is arranging a gathering at Area 51. The gathering is to demand information on aliens. The organizers advise the attendees to run towards the gates in Naruto

- style (arms swooped behind the chest). Newscasters had to describe the running style used in the popular anime *Naruto*.
- Someone assaulted a fan after leaving San Diego Comic Con. The fan grabbed his Naruto headband which has a metal insignia and hit the assaulter with it.
- An NBA basketball player started wearing custom made sneakers with Monkey D. Luffy, the lead character of *One Piece*, to games.
- The Mexican anthology series, *La Rosa de Guadalupe* had an episode dealing with cosplay. A boy and a girl liked going to school as their favorite anime characters and get bullied.

The AFO Anime Music Video (AMV) team showed 25 AMVs. This year the contest opened up with a film showing the winners of the 20 pervious AFOs. Once can find all of the videos on afoamv.theforgotten.com/2019.php. The list shows the winners handle, the song used, and the anime used.

- Judges Award-Venentine: "Feel Again" by Beirus Beats and "If I Could Talk" by ShutYourTrap to the footage from *Kagerou Project*
- Best in Show bleachshippu5678: "Paralyzed" by NF to the footage from *A Silent Voice*.
